Danielle Clifford Earles, Howard County Office on Aging and Independence (OAI), Nutrition Coordinator: Provides reduction in meals but could be able to do so now.

Liz Branch, Morgan Chapel Food Pantry: Morgan Chapel's pantry is on the border with other communities. Howard County Government pulled together and got food pallets for the community.

Lisa Dolce, Pinnacle Empowerment Center: Helping to expand food distribution.

Lynn Moretz, Howard County Health Department Bureau of Infection Prevention and Public Health Readiness: Tuberculosis (TB), HIV program clients facing food insecurity but can give gift cards for grocery stores.

- Continuous oversight is not needed
- The Food Bank covers liability for the fridges and there are no cameras; each organization does not have to check food every day

Ms. Bezooayehu presented the group with questions to gather feedback:

What has your experience been with food security efforts?

Simon: CEI works with food producers for food assistance programs to ensure people are getting the fresh food needed.

Genesis: What is the difference between the Food Security Committee and Food Council? Yekatit mentioned that the Food Council is comprised of different sectors working on policy solutions. It also works on advocacy with legislative actions in terms of issues and priorities; is narrow and very focused on upstream systems-level solutions.

Erin: ARI is led by people with disabilities and more on work that impacts people with disabilities to determine priorities for policy and advocacy such as written testimony and training along with the opportunity to share.

Brielle: Maryland Hunger Solutions has experience working with Food Councils to bring together experts in food to share. They also do SNAP outreach and is an advocacy organization working on policies with legislators to expand access to SNAP and other nutrition programs They also offer direct service with hunger-free work and food access.
