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Program Presentation

Ms. Parson shared that she conducts Narcan training and outreach and education for the Opioid Overdose Response Program (ORP). Ms. Mallette is the data analyst for the ORP.

Topics discussed during presentation included:

- Overview of ORP
 - ORP leads and coordinates Narcan trainings, conducts community outreach efforts, and provides overdose prevention strategies and support.
- Howard County, Maryland Demographic Data
 - o Population over 332,000
 - Non-Hispanic white make up 48%
 - Similar population distribution of Non-Hispanic Blacks (20%) and Non-Hispanic Asian residents (19%)
 - More females than males
 - Howard county has a higher percentage of residents under 18 years of age (24%) than any other age group
- Non-Fatal and Fatal Overdose Data
 - Since 2020, there has been a consistent decrease in the number of non-fatal overdoses. However, there has been fluctuating numbers for fatal opioidrelated overdoses.
 - Male, adults aged 25-34, and Black non-Hispanic race had the highest non-fatal overdose morbidity.

	Topics discussed during overview included:	

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- Safe Gun Storage for Suicide Prevention
 - Reducing access to lethal means of selfharm, such as firearms, is a cornerstone of suicide prevention
- Map Development: Gun Shops and Ranges
 - Systematic Google Maps analysis of Maryland identifying business offering voluntary temporary gun storage
 - Marketed Safe Storage Map as a suicide prevention tool
- Map Development: Law Enforcement Agencies
 - Purchased Directory from the National Public Safety Information Bureau of relevant law enforcement agencies
- Safe Gun Storage Map
 - Housed on the Marylanders to Prevent Gun Violence
 - Webpage also includes relevant information as to why gun owners sometimes want to store firearms away from the home, wat questions to ask for storage options, and how to safely bring a firearm to a safe storage location.
- Reasons for Declining Participation
 - Gun shops that declined participation shared common concerns:
 - Logistics of returning firearm to owner after temporary storage
 - Background check requirement
 - Responsibility for deciding if safe to return gun
 - Liability for gun during storage
 - Not covered by insurance
 - No space for storage
- Current status
 - Working to update map
 - Developing safe storage window cling

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- Liability considerations
- Funding to expand out-of-home safe storage options

Ms. Zeller, mentioned when tabling community events she passes out Maryland Safe Storage Map materials to Maryland law enforcement and they hadn't heard of it. Dr. Crifasi, shared that the process to get Maryland law enforcement buy in on safe storage efforts and that they are currently working with the National Guard as well.

Barbara Allen, James Place/Opioid Collaborative Community Council, inquired if it's still a good idea to include gun locks in the harm reduction vending machines to go around Howard County. Dr. Crifasi mentioned that gun locks are a great option but may not be used by gun owners as many gun owners use their firearms for home defense and using gun lock means storing the firearm unloaded. Ms. Allen also inquired why Maryland State troopers are not interested in assisting with the Maryland Safe Storage Map. Dr. Crifasi shared that in their talks with different barracks there was buy-in from the lower levels of the law enforcement agencies but that higher level buy-in was necessary and was not there at the time.

Reena Rambharat, HC Local Health Improvement Coalition, inquired if there was data specific to Howard County and what agencies are listed in the Maryland Safe Storage located in Howard County. Dr. Crifasi shared that she will shared Howard County data with HMSPC co-chairs to share with the workgroup.

Ms. Fisher mentioned two concerns she has heard from community members regarding safe storage. One concern being the legality of storing a firearm for

	oneself or someone else. Another concern is safe storage is free or not. Dr. Crifasi mentioned that cost is a barrier to some for using safe storage options, and they are working to get buy-in from law enforcement agencies to provide free/reduced cost safe storage options in the future. Further she mentioned that if someone living with or related to a gun owner and is concerned about said gun owner that they can apply for an Extreme Risk Protection Order.
